Reduce Lunchtime Waste

Welcome to the 2005-06 school year from the **RISE (Recycling is Sim-ply Elementary) Program.** As the RISE coordinator this year, my job is to encourage reusing and recycling materials and to reduce the amount of waste that is thrown away.

Lunchtime visits so far this year have shown that a considerable amount of good food gets thrown away every day. A few examples are whole or half sandwiches, baggies of fruits and/or vegetables, completely uneaten fruits, unopened containers of yogurt, and the crackers, cheese, and meat from Lunchables (which means that the pudding or candy and Capri Sun drink were the only items actually consumed).

Did you know that every day over 10 pounds of uneaten or unfinished fruits and vegetables are added to our compost bin?

In an effort to make parents more aware of their child's lunchtime habits, our school (with support from Sra. Beck) will not allow students who bring their lunch from home to throw away uneaten food during the month of October.

Perhaps this will be a good opportunity to have a discussion with your child about how hungry they are (or aren't) at lunchtime and how everyone can avoid wasting food.

Options might include sending half of a sandwich instead of a whole sandwich, allowing students to choose the fruit or vegetable they bring, or remembering to put an ice pack in the lunch box if yogurt is being sent.

Chavez Students Can 'Trick-Or-Treat For UNICEF'

Want to go trick-or-treating and save lives at the same time? Read on! The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) is the leading children's organization in the world. A recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize, UNICEF works in more than 160 countries and territories to provide children with life-saving medicine, nutrition, clean water, sanitation, education and emergency relief.

An estimated 7 million children are saved each year by the efforts of UNICEF and its partners. UNICEF is currently working to help children affected by Hurricane Katrina — the first time in its 55-year history that UNICEF has provided humanitarian aid within the United States.

But I'm just a child, how can I save lives? "Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF" was created in 1950 when a group of kids in Philadelphia collected \$17 in decorated milk cartons on Halloween to help children whose countries were devastated by World War 2. Over the years, more kids got involved.

The pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters collected by children add up. Since 1950, young people have raised over \$125 million through "Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF."

For the last 25 years, Davis children have collected an average of \$3,000 a year by Trick-or-Treating for UNICEF. Last year alone, they raised over \$13,000! In fact, the children of Davis have been named official "UNICEF Emissaries" by the U.S. Fund for UNICEF in recognition of their contributions. Last year our César Chávez students collected over \$1,500! How much do you think we can raise this year? I'm convinced that kids can help kids. How do I sign up?
