<u>A Message from Your PTA President, Cathy Farman</u> PTA Needs You More Now Than Ever

In almost every column this year, I have mentioned the upcoming budget cuts for the 2010-11 school year. It is hard to know exactly what those cuts will look like, but they will be severe and touch every DJUSD student. Soon beloved teachers and staff will receive pink slips, and this will begin the unpleasant process of cutting \$5.6 million from DJUSD's budget. I encourage you to read the District Dollars article in this newsletter and go to the website to understand more about DJUSD's budget process. Davis Schools Foundation (DSF) will begin a campaign to fund as many teacher and staff positions as it can; watch for announcements from DSF.

Meanwhile, PTA will be as important as ever next year. Your PTA is beginning the process of filling PTA positions for the 2010-11 school year. At the March 25 meeting, officer candidates will be nominated. If you haven't yet volunteered to help Holmes PTA, do it now!

At the junior highs and high school, the PTAs tend to operate a little more quietly than at elementary schools. But junior high PTAs still

STAR writing assessment on March 2, and then our whole school will be gearing up for the state standards tests later in the spring.

Between April 22 and May 1 students will be taking the nationally-normed California Standards Tests in English/language arts, math, U.S. history and science. As all schools in the state will be testing during this testing window, at this time we are uncertain when the testing company will have the results returned to us. Although the state uses this testing for accountability purposes and general achievement information, our school staff finds the individual and group information very valuable; it tells us where relative strengths and weaknesses are in our instructional programs and when we are hitting those targets. For example, Holmes' science scores have risen steadily over the years.

The test results are also one of the measures we use when considering individual student's placement in certain classes. Following are a few suggestions to help prepare your student for the testing:

- Please do not schedule appointments or trips during this time. Students not testing during class testing times will be testing with a mixed class setting during make-up times. Research has found that students do their best testing in their own classroom with their own teacher.
- Try to get into a routine that includes early bedtime, breakfast and arriving to school on time. Students arriving late when a class is

testing will not be allowed into the classroom until that section of testing is complete.

• Encourage your student to do his/her best and to use the opportunity to practice test-taking skills which are increasingly important as students look forward to passing the high school exit exam and applying for college, trade schools, or employment.

It has become increasingly clear that our schools will be facing challenging times in the months ahead. Our district is experiencing declining student enrollment. These factors could reduce our school district budget next year by as much as \$5.6 million.

This significant decrease in funding will, inevitably, impact services, programs, and staffing for our schools. As parents, teachers, staff members, and administrators, our job is to make sure that our educational mission remains our top priority. As a community, we must keep our focus on our students and their welfare.

Times like these cause us to pull together. I ask your patience and understanding as we navigate through the difficult days ahead. To the fullest extent our resources permit, we will place first the welfare of the students we serve.

Thank you for supporting and motivating your children to make the most of their learning experiences here at Holmes!

<u>A Message from Your Vice Principal, Kerin Kelleher</u> Information on State and DJUSD School Attendance

There has been a great deal of discussion in the media about attendance and truancy rates in our region, highlighting the negative effects on a child's education as well as on the district's finances. We would like to clarify information that might help students and their guardians understand the latest efforts by the State and the DJUSD related to school attendance.

When students are absent from school, the State allows that absence to be **excused** for medical illness and appointments related to health, along with other less common reasons including court appearances, funerals, religious holidays, etc. Students are allowed to make up assignments for excused absences. Other than the specified reasons allowed by the State, all other absences are **unexcused**. This is not a district decision: it is Education Code and part of required attendance accounting. When students are unexcused, they do not have automatic rights to make up the missed work, and they may be subject to truancy intervention if they accumulate more than 3 days of unexcused absences.

Please know that this effort to determine the status of absences is unrelated to collecting school

funding. The State does not fund a single day of absence for any reason, even the excused days.

This year at Holmes we have also seen an increasing number of students and families taking vacations from anywhere from a few days to a few weeks. Even though students are set up for travel study, this is no substitute for daily instruction directly from the teachers. We hope that if students do have to miss school due to travel, they sign up for travel study and also meet with their regular teachers before and after they return to clarify what they missed while gone.

perform an important function at the schools. To give you an idea of what Holmes PTA does, I will share some of our budget details: This year, Holmes PTA is budgeted to raise just over \$35,000. Of that \$35,000, under \$1,000 is spent on administrative costs and another \$1,500 goes to pay our dues to the State PTA organization. That leaves \$32,500 available for the benefit of Holmes students and families. Annually, Holmes PTA uses the money raised to support Holmes programs such as:

Library books and materials International Day Safe School Ambassadors WEB Staff education Campus beautification Red Ribbon Week Toy Shop

PTA helps teachers with individual requests for program support. Science dissection materials were purchased by PTA this year. Foreign language classes have reading materials this year courtesy of PTA. Finally, your PTA is supporting class-wide field trips at every grade level, relating to Social Studies (7th and 8th grade) and PE (9th grade) curriculum.

PTA also provides "hospitality." We feed our staff three times each year -- on the day they have to set up their classrooms in the Fall, on the day they are finalizing grades at the end of the first semester, and during teacher appreciation week. We also help with Holmes events such as Career Day. PTA also serves the families of Holmes. Do you receive listserv announcements about upcoming events? The listserv is maintained by Holmes PTA volunteers. Do you appreciate the monthly newsletter with detailed information about Holmes? The newsletter is produced by PTA volunteers. Do you use the PTA website? Thank a PTA volunteer for maintaining it. Have you ever attended a parent education event at Holmes? It was organized by Holmes PTA volunteers. Do you use your eScrip or Nugget card to raise money for Holmes? This service is organized by PTA volunteers. Did registration go smoothly for your student this Fall? PTA provided numerous volunteers.

I hope next year you will become a PTA volunteer. We need your help!

Consider this advice from the Drug Free Action Alliance:

As a parent, you have tremendous influence on your child, especially when it comes to his or her decision to use or not to use alcohol, tobacco and other drugs. According to research, for better or worse, the things you do and say matter.

They're watching! Compared to teens who have not seen their parents drunk, those who have are more than twice as likely to get drunk themselves (in a typical month), as well as three times likelier to use other drugs, like cigarettes and marijuana.
